English- Get ready for an exciting term ahead! Our class will be diving into 'The Wild Robot' by Peter Brown. This captivating novel emphasises the significance of friendship, forgiveness, and relationships.
 Roz, the protagonist, finds herself on a mysterious island with no memory of how she got there. Throughout her journey, Roz confronts numerous challenges with unwavering enthusiasm and passion. Armed with logic and compassion, she navigates each obstacle with grace. Roz's endearing personality makes her an inspirational character.

In addition to our exploration of 'The Wild Robot,' students will focus on hybrid writing, blending elements of different genres to create unique and innovative texts. They'll have opportunities to plan, write, and publish their hybrid pieces. We will also reinforce the skills required to proofread and edit writing to ensure accuracy in spelling, grammar, punctuation, and sentence structure. We'll provide targeted exercises, offer constructive feedback, and facilitate engaging activities to assist each student in refining their writing skills and articulating their ideas with clarity and creativity.


Religious Education- In Religious Education we will focuss on God the Creator and the wonder of God's creations. We will read Creation Stories from different religions and cultures, highlighting the similarities and differences.
Pope Francis reminds us that we are called to care for God's creation as responsible citizens and followers of Christ. We will read the picture story book 'Welcome to Country' to understand the Indigenous creation story of the Wurundjeri People.
Later on in the term we will focus on the sacrament of Eucharist in preparation for the Year 4 celebration. We will recognise the significance of the bread and wine, and 'The Last Supper.'

Maths - Last term, we explored the fascinating realm of geometry, delving into prisms, surface area and volume. We tackled various open-ended questions using materials, and we were truly impressed by the curiosity and enthusiasm shown by our learners.

As we transition into the new term, we are gearing up for a deep dive into operations, with a special focus on multiplication and division. These foundational operations are essential building blocks in Mathematics and play a crucial role in solving a wide range of mathematical problems.
What to Expect This Term:

1. Multiplication Mastery: We will explore various strategies and techniques for multiplying numbers, ranging from basic multiplication facts to multi-digit multiplication. Students will engage in handson activities, and real-world problem-solving tasks to strengthen their multiplication skills.
2. Division Dynamics: Building on our multiplication skills, we will delve into division. Students will learn different division methods, understand the concept of division as sharing and grouping, and practise dividing numbers both with and without remainders.
3. Problem-solving Challenges:Students will be presented with challenging open-ended word problems that require the application of multiplication and division skills. These tasks will encourage critical thinking, logical reasoning, and creative problem-solving abilities.

## The Mental Health continuum

We should think about mental health as a continuum, not the simple idea that you either have good mental health or poor mental health. Visualising individuals' experiences of mental health on a continuum moves away from a medical model to a more holistic, nuanced understanding.
A continuum-based approach recognises that children's mental health and wellbeing are dynamic and can change over time. The use of a continuum aims to move away from terminology that may be stigmatising or too limited to capture the wide range of children's emotional experiences. This approach also highlights opportunities for early intervention and is more accessible for children and can make it easier for educators to identify where a student might be with their mental health and hence provide greater ability to support or find support for students.


The Mental Health Continuum can be used as a snapshot of a child's social-emotional wellbeing at a point in time. It can also be used along this table, for educators to track a students mental health and wellbeing over a period of time.


Educators can use the table above to identify how a student's mental health is over a period of time and note which areas of their life are impacted most. Throughout life we all move back and forth along the continuum depending on what is happening around us. It is normal to at times feel overwhelmed and sometimes feel good. What would be concerning would be if someone were feeling overwhelmed, for a lengthy period of time.

Books of the Week


Our library has a series of books, aimed at younger students about different emotions. These books look at feeling sad, scared, angry and happy. They help children to understand that it is normal to feel all of these emotions at different times and some things they could try to do when they feel this way. You are welcome to borrow these books to read at home.

# Holy Rosary Positive Behaviour for Learning 

## Every child has the right to learn and every teacher has the right to teach.

## Lesson Plan: Playing safely and respectfully in the hall

## Step 1: List Learning Intentions and Success Criteria

We are learning to: play respectfully and safely in the hall.
It will look like: children showing respect to others and the activities, as well as being safe around others.

## Step 2: List a rationale for teaching the $b$

## Behaviour

Why is it important?
Holy Rosary School Values: Relationships, Respect, Resilience, Integrity, Kindness (highlight relevant values) Holy Rosary School Expectations: Safety is our right. Learning is our responsibility. Respect is our way. (highlight)

It is important to teach students about how and what they can play in the hall, to ensure that the play is respectful and safe. It's also important so that students can engage in various types of play that allow students to further develop their social skills, creativity and imagination.

Step 3: Identify examples and non-examples of the desired behaviour

What would the behaviour look/sound like?
Examples
-wait outside the hall for the teacher to open the doors
-equipment/activities etc are to be shared -using quiet and calm voices
-packing up what you are doing before you start something else or leave -packing up ten minutes before the bell goes -treating the equipment and activities with respect -playing safely with the equipment and activities -doing handstands, cartwheels and the splits on the gym mats
-entering the hall before the teacher is there -leaving others to pack up the things you were playing with
-taking things off others without asking first
-yelling and using loud voices
-leaving the hall without helping, when the teacher says
that it's time to pack up
-excluding others
-doing somersaults and flips on the mats or handstands against the walls

- packing equipment away in the wrong boxes or not putting them back in the cupboards
-running in the hall
